Balancing In Real Life

We often hear people wanting to bring their life into balance. I like to think that balance is a process, not a destination. There are many different physiological factors to balancing, some of these include: structure, muscle, brain power, stress, focus, the surface you are balancing on, and practice.

Let's focus on practice. Practicing your balance doesn't only need to happen in your yoga, Tai Chi, or fitness class, every time you walk or run you are using balance. Every time you are standing and waiting there is an opportunity to practice balancing. Shifting your weight from one foot to the other is practicing balance. You don't even need to lift your foot up off the floor. You can use a wall, grocery cart, or walker to give you more stability.

The key is practice, practice, practice!! It doesn't need to be fancy! You can balance while waiting for water to boil, a microwave to run, when you are calling someone on the phone or when you are waiting at the pharmacy. Practice is cumulative. Little practices all add up!

Change your balance confidence a little bit at a time to get big results!!


